Cinematography Master degree candidate Chin-Yuan Liu chose to explore the cinematography of Mark Lee Ping-Bing, a respected Taiwanese cinematographer who had originally been working as a camera assistant and documentary cinematographer before making a rapid and unexpected switch to narrative cinema. Not surprisingly, the author shows admiration and deep respect to Mark Lee's craft throughout the thesis, and yet precisely analyses his work and sets it into context of Taiwanese cinema.

The thesis is written very clearly and engagingly. Structured logically and illustrated with a plenty of stills from Mark Lee's films, makes the topic not just appealing, but highly

stimulating even to a reader not familiar with the Taiwanese new wave or Taiwanese cinema in general.
