Vladislav Švestka's bachelor's thesis focuses on the Hyperpop subculture, particularly its visual aesthetics, characterised by a mix of glitches, errors, lo-fi aesthetics, hyperrealistic imagery and a certain amount of nostalgia and irony. The work is structured and written in an excellent academic style. The author first describes the development of Hyperpop and then discusses the "normalising" role of streaming services (and their algorithms) on Hyperpop. He devotes a separate section to the emancipatory nature of Hyperpop for LGBTQIA+ minorities. The thesis is excellent in capturing the ambivalences between which Hyperpop moves: imperfections and hyperrealism, alternative and mainstream, subversion and consumerism, capitalism and anti-

capitalism, hauntology and anti-hauntology. Vladislav Švestka has presented an excellent work in descriptive, interpretative and theoretical passages.
